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

Recently, the awareness of people towards aesthetic procedures is continuously rising.



What is filler?

- > A substance that is injected in different sites of the face, to;
- Plump thin lips
- Enhance shallow contours
- Soften facial creases and wrinkles
- Improve the appearance of recessed scars
- Reconstruct contour deformities in the face
- Decrease or remove the shadows in the lower eyelids



ADD OR RESTORE VOLUME

What are the types of fillers?

- Hyaluronic Acid (HA):
- Naturally occurring substance already found in skin
- o Soft and gel like
- Results are temporary (6-18 months)
- Calcium Hydroxylapatite (CaHA):
- Naturally occurring substance found in bones
- o Thicker than HA
- Last longer than HA
- Stimulates natural collagen production
- Poly-L-lactic Acid:
- o Biocompatible biodegradable synthetic substance
- o Collagen stimulators
- o Smooth file lines helping rebuilding natural collagen

Factors for a successful injection:

- Choosing the right candidate
- Injecting the proper material
- Correct method of injection

Who is a good candidate?

- Hollow tear troughs
- Dark circles
- Visible blood vessels
- Volume replacing after accidents or surgeries



NEVER TREAT PUFFINESS WITH FILLER INJECTION





Injecting the proper material:







Hyaluronic Acid base filler

Correct method of injection:

- Avoid superficial injection (post orbicularis muscle)
- Avoid large bolus (volume)
- Needle or cannula
- Distribute the filler properly (remoulding)
- 2 3 sessions

Mode of injection:

- Application of topical anaesthetic (15 20 minutes)
- Injecting the filler (Needle or canula)
- Site of injection: post-orbicularis muscle
- Apply ice compresses after the session for 2 3 hours

Needle vs Cannula

Short sharp tip

Long blunt tip

Multiple entry points

Single entry point

Higher risk of bruising Less risk of bruising

More precise

For large areas



Possible side effects:

- Redness
- Puffiness (bumps under eye)
- Small red dots at the injection site(s)
- Bruising
- Vascular occlusion
- Uneven results
- Tyndall effect (superficial injection close to the skin)

















TAKE HOME MESSAGES

- Aesthetic non-surgical provedures are inevitable
- Filler is a useful tool for rejuvenating the periocular area
- Following the proper guidelines provides satisfactory results
- Counseling before the procedure is very important
- Be conservative as much as possible (patient will forgive you)

Don't put the blame on the filler, but on the injector
